


### A National Food Strategy to Address Long-Standing Food System Challenges

Vermont Law School's <u>Center for Agriculture and Food Systems</u> (CAFS) and the Harvard Law School Food Law and Policy Clinic (FLPC) are pleased to announce the launch of <u>The Urgent Call for a U.S. National Food Strategy: An Update to the Blueprint</u>.







Released in late October, the report renews the call for a coordinated national approach to tackle the problems plaguing our fragmented food system in light of COVID-19 and the ongoing movement to address systemic racial inequality in the United States.

CAFS and FLPC published the original Blueprint for a National Food Strategy in 2017. This updated report builds on its recommendations, providing a roadmap for the federal government to ensure its food policies advance, rather than impede, broader policy goals, from public health and social justice to resilience against climate change. And it does so in a new context: The COVID-19 crisis has intensified the need for a national food strategy, and the recent election provides an opportunity for the incoming administration to take action.

## Panel on Chapter 12 Relief for Farms

While bankruptcy is often associated with negative connotations, filing for Chapter 12 relief can present opportunity for farmers. Not only can it help farms avoid or recover from financial distress; it can also help save taxes due when transferring a farm, and greatly expand farmers' options to sell, transfer, or transform their operations. During a recent webinar hosted by our Vermont Legal Food Hub and the U.S. Bankruptcy Court, a panel of experts explained how the Chapter 12 option works. ## **Current Issues in Animal Law Lecture Series: A Human Right to Nature**


Litigation pending before the Ninth Circuit treats a right to nature, and wilderness in particular, as part of the scope of liberty protected under the Constitution. That case alleges that the climate crisis—and the federal government's response or indifference to it—presents a threat to liberty. How is there such a right? Last week, Vermont Law School's Environmental Law Center brought together three attorneys working on this key issue in animal law. #### A New Legal Resource for the Produce Community









Last week the teams at CAFS and UVM Extension's <u>Northeast Center to Advance Food Safety</u> (NECAFS) <u>announced the launch</u> of a free online legal resource for farmers, food producers, and technical service providers.

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) has resulted in a sweeping overhaul of federal food regulation in recent years. Consequently, farmers and food producers are now navigating new regulations and facing inspections of their operations, many for the very first time.

That raises new legal questions for the produce community—and our new website, available at <a href="elsi.necafs.org">elsi.necafs.org</a>, aims to answer them. The site includes an interactive map illustrating the specifics of each U.S. state's produce safety laws, as well as seven fact sheets covering the most pressing legal questions.


### Join the CAFS Crew: Now Hiring Summer Interns!
