This one-credit course will provide in-depth exposure to the most useful, efficient, and effective strategies and resources for environmental legal research, including environmental news/updating services, specialized information databases, environmental dispute resolution resources, science and statistics sources, state environmental resources, administrative law research, legislative history, archives of environmental information formerly on federal government web sites, and international environmental legal research.

The course is designed to prepare environmental law students to research well while in law school and in practice.

The Research Guide Topic Description is due on Tuesday June 1, before 10 a.m., submitted on TWEN.

The Research Guide is due on Friday, June 18, before 3 p.m., submitted on TWEN.

Throughout the course, students will use the resources and strategies being taught in the course to conduct research on a topic/issue of their choice, reflecting what they have learned in this course, which they will assemble into a Research Guide.

Students: Submit a Research Guide Topic Description of the environmental legal topic you intend to research *and* your specific intended Audience for the Guide. Research Guide information can be found under Assignments on TWEN.

Choose a topic focused on U.S. environmental law, federal and/or state.

Assignments:

Time will be spent more with hands-on research experience rather than with reading about research. There is no textbook.

Pre-Class Assignments:

It is essential that pre-class work be done before each class.

In-class work will build on pre-class work, and students will be expected to share, during class, how they explored resources, and the resources they select for their Research Guides.

TWEN Site:

The Syllabus and Research Guide information - posted on the course TWEN site.

Grading:

Students will be evaluated on the quality of their Research Guide, focused on an environmental issue of their choosing, **reflecting what they have learned in this course**, as well as class participation.

Class 1

In Class: (This first assignment is, by far, the longest)

- Research Guide
- Research Strategy
- VLS Environmental Book , Ebook Collections, and WorldCat
- VLS Environmental Law Subscription Databases
- VLS LibGuide - Environmental Law Resources
- VLS Environmental Law Research Sources (ELRS) – Database of free web sites

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Be successful in using the Advanced Search option and other features of a law library catalog as well as through WorldCat, the world's largest online catalog, to efficiently access environmentally-related books available online through VLS, and at other libraries.

- Select and effectively use subscription databases that contain explanatory, analytical, and practical environmentally-related resources.
- Understand that you have an ethical and professional responsibility to conduct effective environmental legal research.
- Be competent in knowing how a comprehensive Environmental Law Resources LibGuide can lead researchers to just about anything they need.
- Effectively identify and locate environmental legal research free web resources using VLS's *Environmental Law Research Sources (ELRS)*, a database of judiciously selected and categorized web sites

Pre-class Reading and Assignments and applying what you've learned to your Research Guide:

- Thoroughly read the Research Guide instructions in "Assignments" on the TWEN site. Determine a title for your Guide, the intended recipient, and a description (one paragraph minimum to one page maximum) of your Research Guide topic. Choose a U.S. federal and /or state topic. You can add an international perspective, if you wish, but the focus must be on U.S. environmental law. **Submit the title and description to TWEN, before Tuesday, June 1, 10 a.m..**

- Do an Advanced Search in Julien for something related to your Research Guide topic. Limit your search results to material type: ebook. Browse your search results.
- **WorldCat** (a free site)

Explore. For identifying relevant books, it is almost unbeatable. It lists nearby (mostly academic) libraries that own the books. It also indexes additional resources, and often links to full-text material.

VLS *Environmental Law Research Sources* is a collection of 500+ free websites organized by topic, with descriptions, selected in consultation with VLS faculty and students.

Class 2

In Class:

- Current issues in Environmental Law – how to keep up with the news.
- Environmental Dispute Resolution - We'll explore these resources together in class.

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Be knowledgeable about a variety of environmental law and news sources including through use of resources included in the VLS Environmental Law Research Sources (ELRS) database.
- Have explored social media sites and discovered the vast array of environmental law news outlets.
- Understand the difference between a general environmental news feed and a specific news alert that is based on your individual, specific search query, and gain experience in setting up thoughtful and focused environmental news alerts.
- Be knowledgeable regarding a variety of environmental dispute resolution sources as well as strategies for learning about additional EDR sources.

Pre-class Assignments and applying what you've learned to your Research Guide:

- Choose one environmental news source from Environmental Law Research Sources (ELRS) <http://environmentalresearch.vermontlaw.edu/index.cfm> , and review the source.
- Find a news source related to your Research Guide topic or some other aspect of environmental law, using twitter, an app, facebook, reddit, etc. Be prepared to share recommendations in class.
- Set up a Google ***News*** Alert related to your Research Guide topic.
- Set up an alert using Westlaw, Lexis Advance, or Bloomberg Law.
- It is also possible to set up a Google Scholar Alert. Set one up if interested.

Class 3

In Class:

- Specialized Internet resources

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Have effectively used a variety of different types of specialized resources including a non-profit, non-advocacy environmental group that specializes in education of environmental law professionals, a mega legal research site, a legal organization site, law firm sites, and national and regional advocacy sites.
- Be aware of and recognize the biases that exist in different web sites.
- Be knowledgeable regarding how to critically evaluate the quality of a website before relying on the information the site provides, by considering authority, accuracy, comprehensiveness, and currency of the site.
- Learn how to access Environmental Information no longer available on federal government web sites through a VLS LibGuide. (In class, no pre-class assignment for this)

Class 4

In Class:

Non-Legal environmental research

- Statistics
- Scientific research

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Have a foundational knowledge of specialized resources for identifying reliable sources of statistics, nationally and internationally.
- Be efficient in locating scholarly sources that contain statistical information.
- Have critically researched, evaluated, and effectively used a variety of quality sources containing scientific information related to the environment, considering authority, accuracy and comprehensiveness of the source.

Pre-class Reading and Assignments and applying what you've learned to your Research Guide, if applicable:

- Do a Google search for statistics related to your topic.
- Do the same search in Google Scholar.
- Note differences in your results.

Class 5

In Class:

- Environmental Resources using Westlaw, Lexis Advance, Bloomberg Law

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Have a deeper understanding of the environmental law materials available through Westlaw and Lexis by effective use of practice area and content type selections, filters, specialized sources, etc.
- Have knowledge of additional reputable legal research sources commonly used by attorneys, such as CaseMaker and FastCase.

Pre-class Reading and Assignments and applying what you've learned to your Research Guide. Use Westlaw, AND Lexis:

Westlaw:

- Click on > Practice Areas > Energy & Environment. Explore and search for something relevant to your Research Guide.

Lexis Advance:

- Scroll down to Practice Area or Industry > Environmental Law and/or Energy & Utilities Law. Explore and search for something relevant to your Research Guide.

Optional: Because it is important for you to be able to navigate new Legal Databases, explore the following two which are used by many practitioners, and note what looks useful to you as an environmental law professional:

CaseMaker (Access through our Subscription Databases)

- CasemakerX is a service supported by the Casemaker Bar Consortium and its 475,000 attorney membership consisting of State Bar Associations across the U.S. Casemaker includes case law, codes & statutes, etc., including state sources not easily available elsewhere.

FastCase (Access through our Subscription Databases page)

- Fastcase's libraries include primary law from all 50 states, as well as federal coverage going back to 1 U.S. 1, 1 F.2d 1, and 1 F.Supp. 1. The Fastcase collection includes cases, statutes, regulations, court rules, and constitutions. Fastcase also provides access to a newspaper archive, legal forms, and federal docket filings.

Class 6

In Class:

- Environmental Law Resources at the State Level

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Be knowledgeable about resources that lead to state legal sources.
- Become familiar state legal resources in one particular state.

Pre-class Reading and Assignments and applying what you've learned to your Research Guide:

- **Read the descriptions for all, and then explore three of the following:**

Environmental Law Reporter (A VLS Database)

Under *Administrative*, there are links for each state agency that deals with environmental issues. *State Update* links to recent state regulatory developments.

Under *Legislative*, *State Laws* takes you (for some states) directly to the environmental statutes on the individual state web site. You can also use the search box.

CaseMaker (A VLS Database)

A free service supported by attorney membership of State Bar Associations. It includes case law, codes & regulations, etc., including state sources not easily available elsewhere. For Vermont, Environmental Court Decisions are included. The Administrative Codes/Rules for each state are included, and conveniently broken down by division/program/agency. For example: Environmental Management, Environmental Quality, Natural Resources, Energy Office, etc.

LegiScan

A legislative tracking service with full text and status of bills for all 50 states (and U.S. Congress). Explore a state of your choice on a topic related to your Guide.

A service that allows you to identify legislators, review their votes, and track bill progress. Explore a state of your choice on a topic related to your Guide.

50 State Surveys on Westlaw

In Search Box, type : 50 state surveys, and note in drop down menu:

50 State Regulatory Surveys. Environmental Laws is a topic with sub-topics.

50 State Statutory Surveys. Environmental Law is a topic with different sub-topics.

50 State Surveys on Lexis

In Search Box, type 50 State and note LexisNexis 50 State Survey: Statutes and Regs in the drop down menu. Environmental Law and Energy & Utilities Law are both topics with sub-topics.

What other approach can you take on Westlaw and Lexis for locating state resources?

Subject Compilations of State Laws On Hein Online (A VLS Database)

A bibliography/list of articles, reports, and books. Subjects include Environmental Protection, Energy, Natural Resources, Climate Change, Wildlife, Water Law, etc. Keyword searches are also possible.

- **Explore environmental resources for the state of your choice. Be prepared to share how you conducted your exploration and what you found.**

Required: State environmentally related agency information.

Suggestions:

The resources of your state bar association. For example, the New York Bar Association has an Environmental & Energy Law section.

Does your state’s environmental regulatory agency issue news releases? Setting up a google news alert for the agency can yield a great deal.

Most state bar associations have a bar journal.

Is there a listserv or twitter feed from a local environmental organization, or from an agency?

What free primary sources are available? Are they easy to use?

Is there any information on recent or pending environmental legislation? Is there a bill

tracking option?

What is useful on the judiciary site?

Does a law library in your state list resources that are and also that are not available online?

Is there a LibGuide/Research Guide that covers your state's legal/law resources?

Is there a Practice Series for your state?

Class 7

In Class:

- Federal Administrative Law/Regulations research
- EPA and other Agency websites

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Have become knowledgeable about and searched for environmental regulations and accompanying materials presented in a variety of formats: e-cfr, Reginfo.gov, Regulations.gov, Environmental Law Reporter, Cornell LII, Westlaw, Lexis Advance, and Bloomberg Law.
- Have explored an environmentally related federal government agency web site searching for information related to your research topic and compared the results when searching for the same information on the same agency web site using Google as your search engine.
- Have become familiar with resources that list and describe environmentally related federal government agencies.

- Research and be prepared to explain why the Preamble, which is published in the Federal Register, is important.

- Choose one Agency web site from the “Government Sites – United States” category in **VLS Environmental Law Research Sources** (ELRS), and explore it thoroughly, looking for information related to your Research Guide. If your agency is not included in ELRS, and you think it should be, let me know!
- Do a google search to try to find the same information you just found on the agency web site.
- Select the agency of your choice and explore options for receiving information from the agency through social media.

Class 8

In Class:

- Statutory Research
- Legislative History Research

Upon completion of this class, you will:

- Recognize the importance of legislative history, which is to clarify, qualify, or amplify understanding of the purpose, intent, or meaning of a statute.
- Be able to identify the documents that make up legislative histories, and the relative authority of each document type.
- Be effective in identifying and locating environmentally focused legislative history documents using a variety of open-source and fee-based resources including: HeinOnline, Proquest Congressional, Legislative Sourcebook, Govinfo, Congress.gov, Westlaw, and Lexis Advance.

- Be familiar with resources that list, summarize, and often provide the full text of environmental statutes.

Upon completion of this portion of the class, you will:

- Be knowledgeable about the most useful specific environmental law resources or strategy used by each of your classmates while during their research.
- Be well aware of the complexity of environmental legal research, of the numerous ways to begin and conduct research, of the vast selection of environmental law resources available to you, and of useful strategies.
